### Vyner Brooke Memorial Service

Last Friday Joshua Watson (Year 9) and Anita Onions (Year 6) represented the College at the Vyner Brooke Memorial



Service at the Albany Residency Museum. The service remembers the sinking of the 'Vyner Brooke,' in 1942 following the evacuation of Singapore. On board were 65 Australian Nurses. Following the sinking and further incarceration as POWs at the hands of the Japanese forces, only 24 eventually returned to Australia. Joshua and Anita along with students from other schools in Albany each laid a wreath in honour of each of the nurses who died. Thank you to the residency Museum for inviting the College to what was a very moving service.



### Bendigo Bank Big Bash Cricket

The Senior School cricket team challenged for the title in the Bendigo Bank Big Bash Cricket carnival last Friday 19 February on the North Road ovals. The format was a 16/16 competition based on the increasingly popular T20 games.

With a bye during game one, St Joseph's challenged Great Southern Grammar School in a scratch match on the artificial turf wicket. Losing the toss and sent in to bat, St Joseph's started well with openers Harry Leo (11) and Darcy Norman (7) combining well. Tom Palfrey (10) and Andrew Henson (8) also batted solidly as St Joseph's finished with a competitive 8/93 off 16 overs. Things were looking promising with a wicket falling in the second over to the off-spin of Daniel Parker (1/32) but the Grammar top order soon got on top and chased down the total in the twelfth over to finish on 5/95 after 12.3 overs.

Game two saw St Joseph's take on top seeds Albany Senior High School on Turf East. Again losing the toss and batting first things were looking good with a spritely start by openers Bronson Leo (13) and Daniel Parker (11). A determined innings by Harry Leo (11) also allowed some glimmer of an upset but when the tail collapsed to leave a total of 43 runs it looked far too little to defend against the batting depth of ASHS. Unfortunately a few fielding errors didn't help the St

Joseph's cause as ASHS cruised to the required runs in the eighth over finishing with 2/44 off 8.1 overs. Nathan Smith (1/7) and Darcy Cameron (1/26) were the best of the bowlers.

The final game against North Albany Senior High School was the last chance for the St Joseph's boys to register a win for the day. Despite batting first again which hadn't been successful in the morning games, openers Bronson Leo (27) and Daniel Parker (51 retired) put on an awesome display of delicate ground strokes as well as impressive big hitting to punish the NASHS attack. With such an impressive opening partnership St Joseph's looked set to post a massive target but a mini collapse in middle order caused by some tragic run outs saw us fall to a respectable 7/127. The NASHS batting line up just didn't have the depth to chase down the total despite some big hitting by their top order who really took to the leg spin of Tom Palfrey. Dean Newbold (2/0) demolished the tail to see NASHS bowled out in 12th over for 55 runs. Nathan Smith finished with (2/8) including a near chance on a hatrick ball in his second over.






