

Thursday was the last full day, which we started with session ten. This session focused on concluding the Warm Fuzzies. At 10.50am we were given the choice of going to the Holocaust Centre or the Art Gallery. Following this, at about 2.00pm, we were given free time to shop in the city. In the evening, four young men from the seminary shared their experiences with us. After dinner we celebrated Mass with Father Michael. At the end of the night we shared each others gifts. It involved each of us reading a message for a classmate and was a very touching way to finish our journey. Before bed some enjoyed the Talent Show while others watched the Footy Show.

The next morning everyone was up early to get ready to leave. We had breakfast and quickly loaded the bus so that we were on our way quite early. We stopped briefly in both Williams and Kojonup but were back in Albany in almost no time. During this journey we had


