FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Guardians, Families, Students and Members of our College Community.



The following is an article from the Catholic Secondary Principal's Australia magazine by April Honeyman, a CASPA Director, from St Columba's College in Essendon.

"As we all know, the first Sunday in September here in Australia is celebrated as Father's Day. It is a day to show gratitude to men who have nurtured us. It is also a day to appreciate the gift of male role models, whoever they may be. When a child is baptised, the father receives a special blessing. They are words which any father, and indeed, grandfather, can reflect upon, year in year out:

God is the giver of all life, human and divine. May he bless the father of this child. With his wife, they will be the first teachers of their child in the ways of faith. May they also be the best teachers, bearing witness to the faith by what they say and do, in Christ Jesus Our Lord.

In our Church it is St Joseph that is celebrated as its finest human father. He is an image of a patient father – watching, worrying, waiting and loving.

So, what do we know of this ordinary man? The oldest Gospel, Mark's, does not name him and yet he appears in the Gospels of Luke and Matthew: both trace Joseph's lineage back to King David. This is important because it establishes Jesus as the promised Messiah, the descendant of David, born in Bethlehem.

We're told Joseph was a carpenter – a working man who lived in Nazareth not far from the thriving crossroads trade route town of Sepphoris. We know he was not rich because when he took Jesus to the Temple to be circumcised he offered a sacrifice of two turtle

doves because he could not afford the usual: a lamb. Interestingly, the translation of "nagger" to "carpenter" in the Jewish Talmud has a different meaning than someone who works building or fashioning wood, it signifies someone who is very learned, wise and highly literate in the Torah.

Joseph is a man of great faith. One who receives important messages foretelling of his family's future via dreams, the truth about Mary's pregnancy, the need to flee to Egypt and when to return to Nazareth. We are told that he took his family to Jerusalem every year for Pass-over – an expensive undertaking for such a poor man.

The Eastern Orthodox Church depicts him as a widower. They say his first wife was Salome and together they had four sons: James, Joses, Judas and Simon, and two unnamed daughters. He is not mentioned at the birth of Jesus and he never speaks.

The last time he is mentioned in the Scriptures is when Jesus is 12 years old and the family goes to the Temple. His death goes unrecorded. So, it is probable that he died before Jesus entered public life. He is not mentioned at the wedding at Cana. At his crucifixion, Jesus entrusts his mother's care to John – something he would not have done if his father had been alive, and upon his death, Jesus' body is entrusted to Joseph of Arimathea, not his father which was the Jewish custom.

History would tell us that Jesus probably spent a great deal of time with Joseph in his workshop and other sites in Nazareth and its surrounding towns where Joseph may have been employed. They must have spent a lot of time together. Joseph provided a family environment for Jesus. Makes you wonder what they talked about in the many hours they spent together. What questions did Jesus ask? If at the age of 12, when he went to the Temple with his parents, got lost, and spent the time with the Rabbis asking and posing extraordinary answers much to the amazement of these sages; then what were the conversations between him and Joseph about between the ages of 12 and 30? Could Joseph satisfactorily answer the questions? And we know that families are the perfect training ground for learning tenderness, forgiveness, respect, fidelity and love. Virtues that are generally taught, not caught.

Joseph in the Scriptures comes across as quiet, thoughtful, unobserved, unrecognized, humble and silent – like many of the invisible, marginalised people in our own lives who contribute so much, but are thanked so little. In his ready acceptance of Mary and her unborn child, Joseph teaches us that love can be found in the most surprising places. In a society based on strong religious scriptures which controlled what was socially acceptable and what was to be shunned and condemned, Joseph shows us the power of love. Joseph drew from what his faith really told him in his heart and in doing so gave hope not just to the pregnant unwed Mary, but to the world itself. In his unquestioning and willing acceptance of his new family, Joseph places love for the other at the very centre of his life. He teaches us the power of a simple life lived well.

Amongst the amazing and the miraculous, he is a revelatory figure, providing a counterpoint to the dramas that often take place around him. Whilst he is never centre stage, he allows us, the everywoman and everyman, to be participants in the wonderful Jesus stories. We can stand with him, slightly off to one side, at the edge of the shadows, witness to the miracles, and yet a critical part of them. For without the ordinary, the life lived as it should be, how are we to measure the extraordinary? And how are we to understand that there is a role for all of us, for each of us, in every miracle, in every miraculous action.

Joseph teaches us the power of constancy. To be people with faith we must be willing to trust in the power that comes from living it daily in every circumstance and with every person. Joseph did not love and believe because he was surrounded by miracles, but rather he placed his faith at the centre of his life, knowing that in doing so, he was doing what his God called him to do. He lived his faith, faithfully all the days of his life.

And finally, Joseph teaches us that we must readily accept the challenge of responding to the call. Whilst we do not know a great deal about Joseph and his thoughts, we know a great deal about his actions. And, that is what he was: a man of action. Called upon to shoulder the responsibility of a new wife and soon to have a family, he does not procrastinate. He does not take time out to contemplate, he doesn't say to Mary, let me think it over and I will get back to you in a month or so, instead he envelopes her in his love and builds a

life for her – the potential outcast. He doesn't second guess the flight to Egypt and the return, but immediately takes his family away from harm and to safety. He is faithful and strong. While Joseph is a man at the fringes of many of the Jesus stories, we must not make the mistake in assuming that he was without choice. He is nothing if not deliberate, nothing if not faithful, nothing if not filled with love. On the eve of Father's Day, his story is a gentle reminder of the importance and significance of father figures in the lives of all our students."

On Tuesday, Endless Praise, a Christian Band workshopped our Junior School Choir and our Liturgical Music Group. After lunch the group held a performance for the Year Seven and Eight Liturgical Music Group students. Our Liturgical Music Students joined Endless Praise for one of their final numbers. Thanks to Mr Scanlon and Mrs Tassicker for coordinating this very worthwhile visit.



All classes have been briefed on the coming Mission Fun Run and been made aware that all funds raised assist in providing support to the Wheelchairs for Kids Foundation. 
Special Visitors to Years Six and Seven Classes

To Parents of Kindergarten Students



Year Ten Keys for Life (Driver Education)

Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE)

Students in Year Twelve are now reaching the last weeks of their final school year and what should be a very focussed time for all. A key element of this time should be the knowledge that the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) is the most important achievement at the end of any student's Year Twelve schooling. All Year Twelve students should know whether they are on track to gain this certificate. Schools are responsible for the 'tracking' of students' progress to ensure they are progressing towards this achievement.

Online application to TISC and TAS

Scheduled school times have been put in place to support all students to complete the necessary online applications for their applications to Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC) and Tertiary Admissions System (TAFE – State Training Providers). It is essential that all students complete this process by the end of September to secure a place at their preferred Post School Institution in their preferred course. As always, there is the opportunity to change preferences along the way.

WACE External Examinations

Practical Physical Education Stage 2 Examinations

Students who are enrolled in the Physical Education Stage 2 Course will be required to attend and to participate in their respective practical examinations. These practical examinations will be held in Albany and in the Metropolitan area during the first week of the Term Three holidays from Monday **1 October to Sunday 7 October**. All students have been notified of their respective venues, dates and scheduled times.

Trial WACE Examinations Stages 2/3

All Year Twelve students who are enrolled in a WACE Stage 2/3 Course **MUST** complete their Trial WACE Examinations to be held at the College commencing **Monday 8 October and concluding on Tuesday 16 October**. The timetable for these examinations has been published and all students have been given a copy. A copy can also be accessed through the College website. Thorough revision and seeking the assistance and guidance from teachers is highly recommended for all students to achieve pleasing results. It is important to arrive at least 20 minutes prior to the commencement of each examination. Additional copies of the timetable can be collected from the College Administration Office. As this event is held during the Term Three holidays; students may wear casual clothing compliant with the College Dress Code of the College Diary.

Parents can best support their sons and daughters by encouraging set routine study habits, plenty of healthy nutrition and sleep. Family support is a positive ingredient for students during this time and work and social life should be kept to a minimum. Social media should be kept to a minimum during this period. We do thank and value the support that parents/carers and their families give to their sons and daughters who are juggling the many aspects of their final school journey.

Year Ten Outdoor Education Kalgan River Hike Report

Tuesday 21 August was a day of both physical and mental challenge for the Year Ten Outdoor Education class. The aim of the day is for students to do some prior planning and preparation as though going out on an overnight expedition, even though only going out for a day. Hopefully, by participating in this exercise, they will learn how much weight they are capable of carrying over varying terrain and distance; how much can actually fit in a pack; where to place things in a pack for ease of access if required, the idea of waterproofing all items, and basically what **has** to be brought...and what really should be left behind!

The day proved to be perfect in terms of learning conditions. The forecast was dismal to say the least: rain, strong gusty winds, the possibility of hail, and a predicated maximum of 14 degrees. Even so, the students turned up for the trial run. Fortunately for several, the forecast was far worse than what they actually experienced. Even so, there was sufficient rain throughout the day to realise that maybe the experience of the older generation is sometimes worth listening to.

The hiking started at the lower end of the Luke Pen Walk on the Kalgan River, and headed up to the old bridge (around 7km up stream) where lunch was eagerly consumed, before completing the return 7km to the bus. The scenery was beautiful yet highly distracting and along with the slippery muddy sections, caused a few slips and slides along the way.

After arriving back at school at the end of the day, tired and sore, but with a sense of both enjoyment and achievement, the students had a far greater understanding of what to expect and how to go about preparing for our final expedition. We should thank the rain which provided an exceptional learning experience in terms of the necessity of waterproofing all gear in order to have a comfortable night on a dry sleeping mat in a dry sleeping bag, having adequate change of clothes, the absolute necessity of a decent raincoat and walking shoes, as well as adequate water supplies and manageable sized tents.

Overall, an enjoyable and very valuable learning curve!
Without challenge, there is no achievement.
